421	Goodyear	3/12/19	Charter amendment changing the City primary/secondary election cycle from Spring of odd-numbered years to Fall of even-numbered years. (Conforms to State law.)	Pass	83.0%
422	Goodyear	3/12/19	Charter amendment clarifying that a candidate that receives a majority of the votes cast for the office at a primary election, is elected to the office. (Election does not require a majority of the voters in the election.)	Pass	79.9%
423	Goodyear	3/12/19	Charter amendment clarifying the swearing in of newly elected members of the Council as the first regular meeting in the month following the general election.	Pass	83.7%

Q1	Chino Valley	5/21/19	Authorizes the Town to implement an initial primary property tax levy of \$1,500,000. This amount serves as the base for determining the maximum annual primary property tax levy in subsequent years, subject to Constitutional levy limitation provisions. Funds are designated for road purposes and the final year of the tax is FY 2037-38.	Fail	26.8%
Q2	Chino Valley	5/21/19	Authorizes the purchase of several specified water systems and any other water systems within five miles of the Town boundaries.	Fail	42.5%
<b>YUMA COUNTY</b>					
---	San Luis	5/21/19	Authorizes the City to implement an initial primary property tax levy of \$1,350,000. This amount serves as the base for determining the maximum annual primary property tax levy in subsequent years, subject to Constitutional levy limitation provisions. Funds are designated for police, fire, parks and recreation, and public infrastructure.	Fail	14.1%
